Thus Speaks Peter Victor:

All of us must have wondered at one time or another what we are doing here and, more important, where we are going next. Often such thoughts are of nothing more than the opportunities that may come our way or of the people we may be lucky enough to meet. But "whatever will be, will be" is unsatisfactory and there is doubtless something else to be said. What is that something?

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Every thoughtful decision implies a value, and every opportunity we are yet to face implies a choice. Consequently even though we cannot know just what the nature of our choices will be, if we are conscious of our values we can predict the sort of opportunities we are likely to take and those which we are likely to forego.

Such a consideration is very relevant to the current disapproval shown by some of the interest shown by others in working for a company which produces armaments. This disapproval centres largely on the values that the decision to take such a job necessarily implies. A person is only fooling himself if he thinks that voluntarily becoming a part of the war machine can be a value free choice. To justify our actions on the grounds that we are not affecting the total outcome is an empty justification. The choice is between associating or disassociating ourselves with something which each of us must evaluate. Just as when we are one of several thousand who has been entertained at a theatre, our clapping makes no perceptible difference to the level of the applause. But only if we like what we have experienced do we clap, and, more generally, only if we approve of something do we make our contribution.

So the problem of where we are going is not intractable after all. Our values give us our direction. Take a look at yours; you may be surprised at where your present path is leading.
